## Living Water Retreat House

The brand new Living Water Retreat House has 12 individual sleeping rooms with gathering space and a kitchen. It will be used for adult confirmation leaders in



the summer and for year-round retreats. Two groups have been critical to the construction efforts of this project. First, Mission Builders, a skills-based ELCA group, along with volunteers, spent the spring and summer getting this project off the ground. Prairie Gold Homes, a

non-profit organization running an innovative job training program in collaboration with the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services, worked closely with our Building & Grounds crew to bring the project to near completion.

### GOD'S IDEA COMES BACK TO NLOM



In 2002, NLOM launched Operation IDEA as a program to reach out to people of all ages, asking them to consider if God was calling them to serve as a pastor. The acronym, IDEA, stands for Invite; Discern; Excite; and Act. After several years, Operation IDEA was gifted to the Nebraska Synod, to support its initiatives to raise leaders for Christ's church. In 2015, the name was changed to "God's IDEA."

In 2016, the Nebraska Synod asked NLOM to again manage this set of programs. Nebraska Synod Bishop, Brian Maas, says, "Going forward as true partners—leaning on NLOM's continuing programmatic and hospitality strengths while incorporating Synod staff's connections—multiplies the potential impact of the ministry."

John and Sam are refugees. Their family moved to Omaha two years ago, fleeing the violence of their homeland in the South Sudan. They, like many other refugee families, have found support through friends at Messiah Lutheran Church in Ralston. Messiah Lutheran is passionate about making sure these wonderful kids get to Carol Joy Holling Camp and they have committed to paying half of the registration fee. The CJH Campership program covers the other half.

For John and Sam, coming for a week of summer camp is a new experience in so many ways. While their friends from church prepared them for the fun and also for all the "bugs and spiders," their week far surpassed even what they hoped for. From swimming to hiking and the high ropes courses, Sam had "one of the most fun weeks of my life."

John describes what it was like coming to CJH, "The first day I came here, I was nervous. I didn't know anyone here except for my brother. But from the first day, I was able to get to know other people really quickly. That was a big deal because it hasn't been easy for me to make friends here, even at school." Sam added, "At camp, I learned that God is with me all the time, no matter what. God loves everybody and we're all part of the same group. We're all part of one big community, and it doesn't matter where you come from or what you look like."

Mary Mayfield knows all too well of the things that we can accomplish when we work together. Since Mary's daughter, Ann, came to camp many years ago, Mary has found ways to partner. Her congregation, St. Matthew Lutheran Church/Omaha, holds an annual ice cream social to raise money for camp; she has donated a quilt for the Quilt Auction EVERY single year; she has coordinated many Nebraska Synod Women of the ELCA Saved to Serve weekends at Carol Joy Holling and Sullivan Hills Camp; and she leads the annual Tanzania Fabric, Fun and Faith retreat which raises funds to support scholarships for the women of Tanzania.

Mary says she believes all of these partnerships contribute to the future of the church, "Camp is important to the young people of our congregations and the development of their faith. When kids come back from camp, they are stronger contributors to the church – maybe not right then but definitely later."

# Makes a Difference



Several years ago, David Mann's pastor at St. Michael Lutheran Church in Omaha invited him to serve as their congregation's Parish Activities Coordinator. And, so it began. Mann's mission was to recruit the "young at heart" men to engage in church in a different way.

Mann has organized and led groups of more than 20 men on trips to Sullivan Hills Camp for a weekend of serving. "We've trimmed lots of trees, installed the Gaga Pit, laid paving blocks, set up beds, cleaned, put in hundreds of fence posts and rolled wire for the fences around the property. It's good hard work and,

a lot of times, it's work that is hard to find people willing to do."

Mann embraces this kind of work, but more importantly, he embraces the value of such an experience for the guys that go on this trip. "The comradery of working shoulder to shoulder with different generations is great. The passing on of friendship and knowledge outside the walls of the church is huge. You get to be a family and grow pretty close. The biggest benefit I see — after we get back home — when these guys go to church on Sunday, they don't just see other people they just know of, they can look at these guys and know who they really are – what they do, where they are from and what they are made of. Those relationships strengthen the whole church."

Sullivan Hills Camp has become a special place for this group of volunteers. Mann says, "when you work so hard and connect with others while you are doing it, it is bound to become an important place for you. And, these guys love that we are doing work to benefit summer campers."




